I have had the great good fortune to live most of my life within a stone's throw of the natural world. You can't see my house from an aerial view of Google maps because there are so many native pine trees in the way. A leisurely five-minute stroll to the end of my road brings me to the banks of the Hudson River which, at this point in its journey, is close enough to its headwaters to still be a bit on the wild side.

But something changed here about six years ago which

alarmed me quite a bit. Nearly half a century ago, my mother had planted a lovely rhododendron bush in front of the house which, when it bloomed in the spring, literally hummed and quivered with the vast number of bees that came seeking its pollen. This was such a regular occurrence that, like the trees and the river, I had come to take it for granted.

That is, until the spring of 2011.

That year the bush bloomed as gloriously as ever but, for the first time in my memory, it neither hummed nor quivered. The bees, which had once been beyond tallying, were almost entirely gone. I actually went searching for them, and the ones I did manage to find I could count on less than one hand. There were three of them. That was it. Just three bees left.

I had heard about a crisis with bees and other pollinators, but it didn't really hit home until my own rhododendron bush went silent. I was puzzled; we use no chemicals on the property and leave most of it in as natural a state as possible.

Where had all the bees gone and, more importantly, how could I get them back?

My research began in earnest; I discovered that bees are particularly fond of blue, purple, yellow and white flowers, preferably from native species. I planted several. I interspersed my vegetable garden with marigolds and narcissus. I put up hummingbird feeders and hand-pollinated the zucchini. Then, having done everything that was within

my control, I waited while whatever was beyond my control re-aligned itself, I hoped.

Nature is all of one piece, isn't it? Tinker with one part over here and a tug is felt over there. Somewhere, someone had tinkered, and my bees were telling me, point blank, that respecting creation is part of respecting the Creator as well.

One season passed into another and yet another, and last spring I began to count bees again.

There were more than a handful now, and I rejoiced when I saw them move from blossom to blossom in the vegetable garden. Fat bumbles found their way to the marigolds, maybe six or so, happily doing the work they were meant to do. And the rhododendron hummed just a bit more.

Such a tiny messenger really, a bumblebee. But what an apparently important message it had to convey.
